- Revd Lowson has introduced *Breadmaking Tuesdays at Shirley* on the third Tuesday of the month members of the community are invited into our church to make bread. No experience needed, beginners are welcome and all ingredients and equipment is provided.
- 4 Films for Lent and A passion 4 art, offered us a refreshing new way to experience the messages of Lent and were well attended by members of our church family and guests from the wider community. Holy Week included a Maundy Thursday Service at Shirley and Easter Communion led by Revd Leslie Griffiths.

## WORK WITH CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

#### Sunday Morning Club Report



- Sunday morning club continues to run on every Sunday (apart from those designated as all age worship).
- Our numbers are holding steady at 2 to 6 club members per session. Although the attending members attending vary, we do get some regular faces! (Syon and Amelie in particular).
- In the last year, we have run a busy and varied programme. During the summer (2022) we thought about the example that Jesus set as the servant King. After reading various bible passages in which Jesus serves others, we came up with some ideas about how we could follow his lead within the context of our own church. These activities included serving drinks after the service, making cold fruit punch drinks for the congregation on the hottest Sunday of the year, gardening, making cards for church members in need and litter picking.
- At Christmas (2022) we contributed to the Christmas tree festival (our tree was themed 'Jesus the light of the world') and covered a range of diverse subjects including Christingles, the importance of prayer, repentance, Jesus and his friends, the

Beatitudes, salt/light and keeping promises.

- Recently, we've been thinking about the Easter story and examining the stories of Lazarus, Palm Sunday and Thomas in greater detail.
- I would like to finish by reiterating our commitment to high quality children's activities at this church on a Sunday morning. As Rosemary, Jenny and I have said on many occasions, we passionately believe that even if we only have one attendee, that child **is important** and the sessions that we run are of immeasurable value.

## PROPERTY COMMITTEE

- The main event during this reporting period was the replacement of the cast iron radiators in the Hall, Rear Hall, Corner Room, kitchen and main corridor with copper piping and modern, high output radiators.
- The church boiler was replaced. The new boiler and basement boiler are now in the Upper Room.

#### Buildings.

- Externally, the buildings are sound and watertight. Some repainting is required to the fascia boards to the church just above the flat roof of the Lounge and the porch. This has been delayed due to covid restrictions and the poor state of church finances.
- Internally the 1930s parts of the building require redecoration. Again, this has been delayed because of covid and lack of funds.
- The current cleaning contractors do a good job with the rooms being generally tidy and well kept.

#### Grounds.

- The grounds, fences and hedges are all in good order. The contractor keeps the grass, hedges and ivy (behind the corner room and kitchen) neat and presentable.
- The Anniversary Garden has added a delightful extra dimension to the grounds and is much admired. Many thanks to all the enthusiastic gardeners who created it and worked hard, particularly during lockdowns and last summer's drought, to maintain and improve it.
- The new trees are now quite well established but will need regular watering if there is another dry summer.

#### Lettings.

• The rooms are sought after and used by many and varied organisations. The fees make a significant contribution to church income.

#### Volunteers.

- Though the property and grounds are in reasonably good order regular maintenance is required to keep them up to standard. In particular, a small team to keep the grounds tidy and free from rubbish, needs to be re-established.

## STEWARDS' REPORT

 At the end of the last Methodist year we said our goodbyes to Choi and Bennie. We had a party with two spectacular cakes, some great music from Tau, some shared memories and we lifted the roof as we sang "And can it be". Choi and Bennie had been our friends and our pastors over many years and we wish them both every happiness in their retirement. Then in September we welcomed Richard and over the months we have been getting to know him and to embrace the new ideas and fresh energy that he has brought us. We look forward with thankfulness as a Church community.

- Our Christmas celebrations saw us try something new as we mounted a Christmas Tree Festival in the Church. Our lets, community and Church groups decorated trees and we had a cafe selling refreshments. We invited everyone from the local community to come and walk round and enjoy the experience. We made no charge but people were invited to contribute to St. Christopher's Hospice. The weekend culminated in a Carol service by the light of the Christmas trees and the Church was full with many people from our own congregation but also many visitors. The fact that it started snowing outside as we sang "Silent night" was a magical moment.
- After Christmas we saw the return of The Great Book Sale! This biennual event had been
  put on hold because of covid restrictions. There seemed to be more books than ever,
  perhaps reflecting the fact that people had bought a lot of books to read during
  lockdown and were now getting rid of them! The sorting of books on Wednesday
  mornings and the sale itself have always been occasions for the community to get
  involved and there was great enthusiasm and appreciation that we were up and running
  again!
- One of the activities introduced by Richard has been bread making. Again the hope is that Church members and people with little or no involvement with the Church will come together to bake bread and share conversation. So far a harvest bread sheaf, white loaves, hot cross buns and soda bread have been baked and the group is growing in size.
- Our Lent and Holy Week activities this year have been given a new focus by Richard. We have watched and discussed four films during Lent, each with some thought provoking material. A group of people have joined Richard at the National Gallery on two occasions to look at some pictures of the passion of Christ. Then on Maundy Thursday Richard led a meditation and communion service focusing on Judas. This was a really moving and thought provoking experience. Charlotte Stonehouse set up a prayer labyrinth on Easter Saturday and on Easter Sunday we had a magnificent communion service led by Leslie Griffiths and Jennifer Potter. About eighty people were there at the service and it was a great celebration.
- We are so fortunate to have a congregation of people with many and various talents but in an article of this type we can't begin to name names and thank individuals. Our recent stewardship campaign will hopefully remind us again of all the gifts people have to offer.

We look forward to another year of worship, fellowship and service to our local community. Thank you all!

## SHIRLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD CARE (SNC)

- SNC moved offices from SMC to West Wickham & Shirley Baptist Church (WWSBC) in August 2021 from where it runs Lunch Clubs on Mondays and Thursdays. In addition there is a Shopping Bus to Sainsbury and Tesco every fortnight and Outings as and when. Medical Drives remain the priority however.
- WWSBC have given SNC notice to leave their office (the Lunch Clubs will continue there) by 31<sup>st</sup> July so SNC are seeking new premises. At the same time Croydon Council have withdrawn financial support for SNC and similar organisations.
- The Film Club at SMC will resume once SNC have settled down in their new premises.

## CROYDON CHURCHES FLOATING SHELTER.

• CCFS has not operated a shelter for rough sleepers since March 2020 due to Covid and latterly the problems with guests and volunteers breathing the same air for more than 12 hours at every host church. Instead every host church has supplied 8/12 loaves of

mixed sandwiches to Nightwatch on the evenings they would have hosted the shelter. Hence SMC supplied sandwiches on the Sundays in November and December 2022.

• If CCFS operates a shelter again it is unlikely that SMC will be able to host it due to the lack of volunteers especially those staying overnight. The church's insurance would be compromised if there was nobody from SMC on the premises at all times.

## HALL GRANGE MHA

- The home is running well and all the residents are supported by the whole of the staff. The residential side has a few spaces while the Dementia side is full. Residents in the Dementia Wing are looked after by caring staff who are trained in that area.
- A variety of activities is usually available to residents on both sides of the home. The activity co-ordinators arrange all sorts of events. The food is also a special area, together with homemade cakes and biscuits, which all the residents enjoy.

- The chaplains help with the well-being of the residents, families and all the staff. They are always available to talk or listen and this is appreciated.
- The Hall Grange Coffee morning was on 13<sup>th</sup> May between 10.00 and Noon. There were stalls and gifts made by the residents.
- On Sunday, 21<sup>st</sup> May, the President and Vice President of the Methodist Church are attending the afternoon communion service.
- The Wilderness Garden has held a few events and there are more to follow over the next few months. The garden has looked good with the spring flowers and the sound of the birds singing and also with the wildlife in and around the garden. The residents and all the staff will enjoy sitting in the garden when the weather gets a little warmer.

- This Committee has not met since September 2020 as there have been no funds to distribute to charities and worthy causes.

## CHRISTIAN AID

- Christian Aid Week 2022 (May 15<sup>th</sup> 21<sup>st</sup>) raised £1,155, plus £261 from Gift Aid making a total of £1,416. This was given to help rural farmers in Zimbabwe combat the effects of Climate Change.
- The Christian Aid stall at the Platinum Jubilee Garden Party on 28<sup>th</sup> May, 2022 raised £51.10.

- Our church's response to the East Africa Hunger Crisis after the worst drought in 40 years in that region, was £250. This was raised from the sale of goods from our weekly stall and the delivery of tea-breads and crumbles during the week.
- We were delighted to once again welcome Revd Cameron Kirkwood, Christian Aid's Volunteer Ambassador for the London churches, to our Christian Aid service on October 30<sup>th</sup>. We saw a film of how children in Sierra Leone were being rescued from collecting rubbish and sent to school.
- Traidcraft Christmas cards were on sale at our stall again, supporting people without the money to put food on the table and send their children to school.
- A Retiring Collection after the Covenant Service on January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023 raised £345.50. To this was added £200 from our stall's 'Emergency Fund' making a total of £545.50. This went to support rural farmers in Malawi.
- In response to the devastating earthquakes in Turkey and Northwest Syria we sent £600 in February 2023.
- Our weekly stall raises a steady source of income and this year the sale of home-made marmalade has been supplemented by beautiful cards supplied by our craft group, home-made fabric bags made by a church member, Margaret Griffith's book featuring the different manse kitchens she has cooked in and knitted Easter chickens. A huge 'thank you' to all who have helped.
- This year's Christian Aid Week (May 14<sup>th</sup> 20<sup>th</sup>) focused on women farmers in Malawi. The money collected will ensure more children will have the chance to finish school and pursue their dreams. It will also enable farmers to combat the effects of Climate Change.
- A group from Shirley plan to take part in the London sponsored walk for Christian Aid this May.

## LEPROSY MISSION

- The congregation has continued to generously support TLM through monetary donations and also by donating stamps, postcards, coins and jewellery. In 2022, financial donations amounted to £1033.85, and in 2023 the total donated so far has been £583.70. Both fantastic amounts – thank you!
- We were blessed to have Community Partnerships Manager Wendy Piccinini to lead our TLM service last year and this year, when she spoke of the development of the Anandaban Hospital in Nepal and the vital work carried out there. We hope to welcome Wendy again in February/March 2024; she is clearly dedicated to the aims of the Mission and is passionate in getting the message across.
- Unfortunately, after many years of raising funds through selling stamps and other collectibles, TLM took the difficult decision to bring this to an end in April 2023 as their value has gradually been diminishing and it was no longer viable to continue. This was disappointing news, but understandable, and we are looking into other ways of raising funds here at Shirley, possibly through holding a quiz or similar event later in the year.
- Finally, I would like to record my thanks to Adele Sluce for her commitment to raising awareness of the plight of leprosy sufferers, to Jean Beecher for organising joint Christian Aid/Leprosy Mission collections, and of course to Jose Riddiough who tirelessly collected, sorted and trimmed stamps over many years and who sadly passed away this month.
